

Urges 'Less Paranoid View of Our Mission'

Galbraith, Opening ADA Convention, Attacks Foreign Policy Establishment

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John Kenneth Galbraith, a card-carrying iconoclast, called on liberals last night to rise up in opposition to "the permanent diplomatic and military establishment and to the New York foreign policy syndicate."

Galbraith, a Harvard economist and a former U.S. Ambassador to India, keynoted the annual convention of Americans for Democratic Action in the Shoreham Hotel with a plea for a foreign policy that took a "somewhat less paranoid view of our mission in the world."

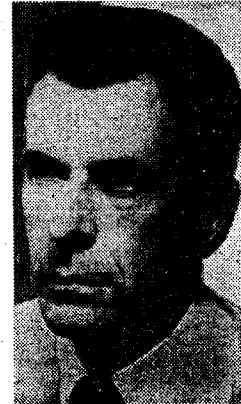
In his biting critique of the foreign policy establishment Galbraith praised President

Johnson as "a force for restraint" in foreign policy.

"Liberals should," said Galbraith, "stand equally opposed to the divine right of wealth and the divine right in the field of foreign policy of Sullivan and Cromwell; Milbank, Tweed, Hope Hadley and McCloy; Lucius Clay; Henry Stimson; Nicholas Murray Butler and the more impeccably traditional member of the permanent foreign policy establishment."

Sullivan and Cromwell is the Wall Street law firm with which the late Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was associated. John McCloy, a long-time foreign-policy advis-
