Cuba Invites Newsmen of U.S. to Fete

The Cuban government has invited American news organizations to send reporters to Cuba to cover the 26th of July celebration.

Premier Fidel Castro himself signed the cabled invitations, which said the reporters could come as guests of the Cuban government or under "other arrangements."

The welcoming of United States journalists to Cuba represents a sharp departure from past Cuban policy of keeping all but a favored few out.

The move is apparently part of Castro's newly launched campaign for normal relations with the United States and the Organization of American States.

The Washington Post was among those receiving invitations. Other invitations reportedly went to:
