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**4 Americans
Cuba Bound**

NEW YORK (AP) — Four American youths, leaving Kennedy Airport for Paris Monday night, said they are going to Havana despite a state department ban on travel to Cuba.

They said they will travel from Paris to Prague, where they will board a Cuban Airline plane for Havana to join 80 other young Americans already in Cuba.

In a prepared statement before their departure, the four said they plan "to see for ourselves the only socialist revolution in our hemisphere."

One Jane Whitman, 22, Paramus, N. J., said she will "study the educational system" in Cuba. Miss Whitman said she was a recent graduate of Antioch College, Yellow Springs, Ohio, and that she plans to teach in the fall in the St. Louis school system.

June Warden, 20, a senior at Barnard College who lived in Manhattan, said she will study the city block system in Havana.

Elizabeth Geismar, 22, Harrison, N. Y., said she is going to Havana "to see what's going on." She is a graduate of Sarah Lawrence College in Bronxville, N. Y.

Edward Rosenfeld, 27, who described himself as a writer from Berkeley, Calif., said his aim was to meet "government officials, poets and artists and explore the cultural arts."

Levi Laub, chairman of the student committee for student travel to Cuba, said the travel expenses will be paid by the Federation of University Students of Havana.
