

# Cuba Stand Clarified by Fulbright

LONDON, May 5—Sen. J. William Fulbright said today that he does not favor American trade with Cuba so long as the Castro regime is exporting revolution.

The chairman of the Senate Relations Committee explained that his March Senate speech in which he noted that the American economic embargo of Cuba was ineffective had been misinterpreted abroad. Incomplete reports of what he said have been cited here as justification for the sale of British buses to Cuba.

Fulbright (D-Ark.), who is en route to Greece and Turkey at the suggestion of President Johnson to emphasize the urgency which the United States attaches to a Cyprus solution, spent an hour conferring with Prime Minister Douglas-Home.

Declining to give details except that the conversation touched Cuba, Aden, Malaysia and NATO as well as Cyprus, Fulbright said that his trip is a fact-finding mission and he has no prefabricated Cyprus solution.

After his conference with Home, Fulbright saw Commonwealth Relations Secretary Duncan Sandys and Lord Carrington, acting head of the Foreign Office. Later he conferred jointly with Labor Party leader Harold Wilson, and Patrick Gordon Walker and Denis Healey, Labor spokesmen on foreign affairs and defense.

Fulbright will leave for Athens by air early Wed-

nesday, also visiting Ankara before flying back to the Hague during the NATO meeting next week.

## Kenya Raiders Trailed

NAIROBI, Kenya, May 5 (UPI)—Men of the Kenya Rifles today were reported tracking 50 Somali Shifta marauders after killing 10 of them in a clash yesterday the Kenya government announced. The Shifta raiders killed four civilians near Isiolo, the government said.
