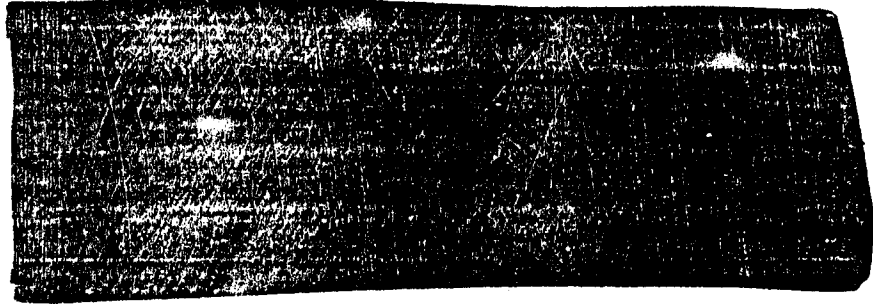

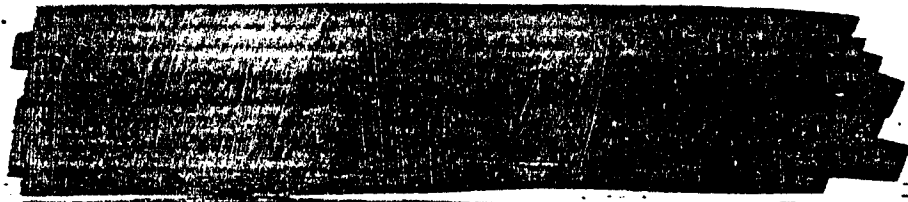

with the murder, Castro looked extremely shaken, and he obviously had difficulty keeping himself under control. His opponents were convinced that the new president would take immediate concrete steps to clarify his position on the Cuban question. Days went by, however, and the leadership's fears were gradually allayed, while the opposition became discouraged.
