Attached to this memorandum is one copy each of two photographs given to District Attorney General Phil M. Canale, Memphis, Tennessee, by William Bradford Huie, a nationally known author who has signed an exclusive contract with James Earl Ray and who has written articles for "Look" magazine concerning the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Mr. Huie has stated that the Federal Bureau of Investigation has shown these photographs throughout the country, and according to Mr. Huie, the Federal Bureau of Investigation believes one of the individuals in these photographs to be identical with the person named "Raoul" whom Mr. Huie has described in his "Look" magazine articles as being an associate of James Earl Ray just prior to the murder of Dr. King. Mr. Huie has stated that these photographs were made by a news photographer at Dallas, Texas, on the day that President John F. Kennedy was assassinated. Huie has told Mr. Canale that he is convinced the Federal Bureau of Investigation knows the identity of the man in the photograph.

The Dallas Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation has advised that the person appearing in these photographs has been identified as one of many persons rounded up by the Dallas Police Department and the Dallas County Sheriff's Office immediately following the assassination of President Kennedy. It has been determined that this person was not booked and that no record of his identity was maintained by either the police or by the Sheriff's Office. The officers who picked up this man recalled that he had been found with two other men in a boxcar about a mile from the assassination scene, but there was no reason to place him under arrest or detain him for any length of time. Also, photographs of this man have not been displayed by FBI Agents during the investigation of the murder of Dr. King.
