Corsican denies he killed JFK

MARSEILLE, France — One of three Corsicans accused in a British television documentary of assassinating President John F. Kennedy at the behest of American mobsters denied Wednesday any involvement in the slaying.

Also, Robert Blakey, chief counsel for the House Select Committee on Assassination, said on NBC-TV's "Today" show the evidence showed the president was hit by two bullets fired from Lee Harvey Oswald's rifle from the Texas Book Depository in Dallas and that he "saw, nothing that would lead me to change any opinions I've had since 1979 when I carefully examined the evidence."

The documentary, "The Men Who Killed Kennedy," claimed a hired killer named Lucien Sarti — not Oswald — fired the fatal shot 25 years ago.

The British Central Television documentary aired Tuesday in Britain said two other hitmen were involved — Martin Sauvour, Pironti and Roger Bocognani.
