FBI Warned Agents of Sheriff Gets
Death Plot--Garrison
L.A. Warrant
for Bradley
...was allowed to ride in
...despite alleged telegram

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison said Tuesday that the FBI put out a message in November, 1963, warning that an attempt would be made on President John F. Kennedy's life during his visit to Dallas.

Garrison said the telegram to agents went as high up as FBI Director Edgar Hoover and specified the date of the assassination attempt as Nov. 22.

In spite of this, Garrison said Mr. Kennedy was allowed to ride in an open car during his Dallas visit. The district attorney declined to elaborate on how he could confirm the FBI message.

Publicizes Story
 Garrison appeared at a news conference to help publicize a Ramparts magazine story on the assassination by former FBI Agent William Turner. "Every word in Ramparts is accurately stated," he said.

Garrison refused to answer many questions put to him, some because he said he did not know the answers, others, he said, because he was not at liberty to do so.

In the rambling news conference concerning his year-old probe of the assassination, Garrison said: "President Johnson knows very well that Lee

Oswald did not pull the trigger."
 —There is a danger that secret files about the assassination may be changed before they are released to the public.

—The indications are very strong that Oswald was informing the FBI that an assassination was contemplated.
 —Edgar Eugene Bradley of North Hollywood, Calif., charged by Garrison last week with conspiring to assassinate Mr. Kennedy, once started a J. Edgar Hoover - for - President movement in California.

—The federal government is protecting the assassins every day.

—At least 15 persons participated in the conspiracy to kill the President, including some members of the "extreme right wing."
 —Communists were not involved in the assassination. "It just didn't happen that way," Garrison added.

Kennedys Not Aware
 Garrison said the Kennedy family is not aware of the real conspiracy to kill the President in 1963 because they have had to depend on President Johnson and Hoover for the facts.

The district attorney said he did not think his news conference violated the guidelines set by Dist. Judge Edward Haggerty Jr. for participants in the Clay L. Shaw assassination conspiracy trial, now set for February.

Garrison said he was not saying anything about Shaw's guilt or innocence and added: "Judge Haggerty does not run the district attorney's office."

The Los Angeles sheriff's office received a warrant by U.S. District Atty. Jim Garrison accusing a North Hollywood man of conspiring in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

The Los Angeles district attorney's office will be asked to rule on the "legality" of the warrant before an arrest is made, Sheriff Peter J. Pitchess said.

The warrant accused Edgar Eugene Bradley, 49, of 12208 Emilita St., of "violation of (Louisiana Revised Statute) 2630 relating to criminal conspiracy to commit murder."

Bradley has insisted Garrison's charge is false.

Receives Notification
 Pitchess received a telephone call from New Orleans Thursday saying a warrant had been issued there for Bradley, who is employed on the West Coast as a representative of Dr. Carl McIntire, a fundamentalist radio evangelist.

However, Pitchess refused to comment on the warrant until a copy of the warrant was received.

When the warrant was received Tuesday, Pitchess said it would be forwarded to his fugitive detail with instructions to contact the Los Angeles district attorney's office to determine the warrant's legality.

"If the warrant is determined valid, procedures will then be instigated to obtain a fugitive warrant," Pitchess said, adding that if and when these conditions are fulfilled, Bradley would be arrested.
