Dear Mr. Zuckerman:

I have been an avid reader of your magazine for over 25 years, since I was 15 years old. I have usually found it to be the most accurate of the news magazines.

In your August 30, 1993 edition of U.S. News and World Report, you ran a special double issue on Gerald Posner's <u>Case Closed</u>. I believe Mr. Posner's book to be inaccurate and full of misstatements and this issue of your magazine as well.

In 1994, assassination researcher Harold Weisberg, wrote a book entitled <u>Case Open</u>. Weisberg accuses Mr. Posner of distorting the truth, to put it mildly. I have read all of Mr. Weisberg's books and have found them to be extremely accurate.

Unless I have missed it, I do not believe your magazine has run one word discussing <u>Case Open</u> and the controversy surrounding the lack of accuracy of <u>Case Closed</u>, including allegations that Mr. Posner claims to have interviewed people to whom he never spoke. I believe you owe it to your readers to at least discuss this controversy.

I suggest you contact Professor David Wrone, a history professor at the University of Wisconsin, Stevens Point, who has been quoted in your magazine in the past. I might also suggest that you contact Professor Gerry Ginocchio of Wofford College, Spartanburg, South Carolina, who is probably the expert on the lack of accuracy of <u>Case Closed</u>. Page 2
