Dear Sir or madam,

I was surprised and disappointed when my "uly letter to your embassy in Washington was returned as "unknown."

I enclose it.

Many changes have taken place in your country since then.

Although I have not seen any account in the newspapers I get, I have heard on the radio that it has been decided that your agency will disclose certain records.

As you will see from the enclosed letter, I have a great interest in any records relating to Lee Harvey Oswald, accused presidential assassin.

I do hope that these records may be disclosed to me and through me to any others in this country who may want access to them.

In practise I make all the records I've ~~got~~ gotten from our government available to all other writers.

No^w past 78 and in impaired health, I've made arrangements for all my work to be available to all others through deposit in a special wing of the new library being constructed at local ~~H~~ood College, and I believe this will be the largest deposit of records relating to the assassination of President Kennedy outside the government.

If as I hope it will be decided to disclose these records to me, if no English translations are available, I believe it may be possible for me to have them translated locally.

Please accept our wishes for a coming brighter future for your country, and for peace in this troubled world.
