I was surprised and disappointed when my "uly letter to your embassy in Washington was returned as "unknown."

I enclose it.

Many changes have taken place in your country since then.

Although I have not seen any account in the newspapers I get, I have heard on the radio that it has been decided that your agency will disclose certain records.

As you will see from the enclosed letter, I have a great interest in any records relating to Lee Harvey Oswald, accused presidential assassin.

I do hope that these records may be disclosed to me and through me to any others in this country who may want access to them.

In practise I make all the records I've set gotten from our government available to all other writers.

No past 78 and in impaired health, I've made arrangements for all my work to be available to all others through deposit in a special wing of the new library being constructed at local food College, and I believe this will be the largest deposit of records relating to the assassination of President Kennedy outside the government.

If as I hope it will be decided to disclose these records to me, if no English translations are available, I believe it may be possible for me to have them translated locally.

Please accept our wishes for a coming brighter future for your country, and for peace in this troubled world.
