Ogle:

After receiving the letter of July 7, 1964 from Paul Ogle I wrote him an answer in which I requested specific information. I received no reply whatsoever.

Ryan:

Self-explanatory. The questions I submitted to Ryan in my letter of October 2, 1964 were based on information given me by Jones Harris, who claimed to have discussed Underhill's alleged suicide with Brynes and the Polish medical student.

Some three or four months ago I, myself, called Brynes in Washington and spoke with him on the telephone. He confirmed what Harris had told me, namely that Underhill was obviously quite dead when the body was discovered and described it as being "yellow-green" in color. I got the impression from him that he had not got as close to the body as the Polish medical student. He claimed to not remember the name of the student. Also, he said that because of his relationship with Mrs. Underhill he wished to be guarded about making any statements for publication. I could not get much else out of him with regard to the other contradictions which I raised in my letter to Congressman Ryan. However, I told him that if there was a chance that the story was to be published I would get in touch with him and clear any statement with him I might use in the piece. I did not have the occasion to call him again.
