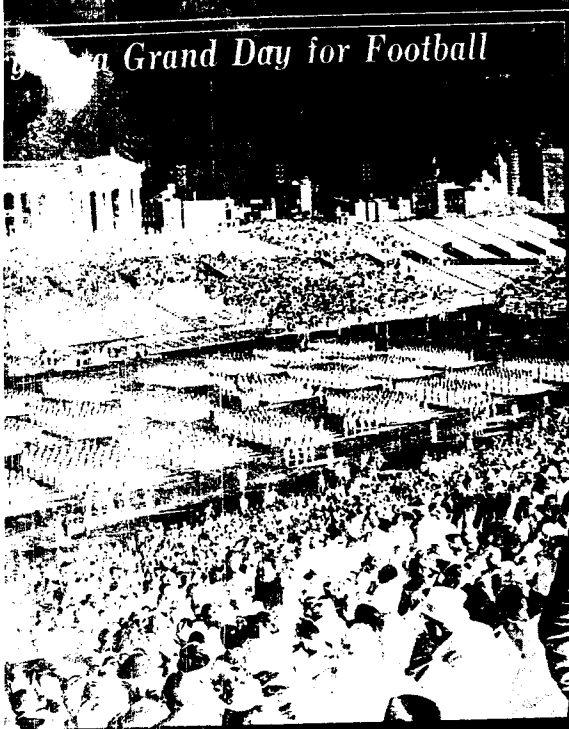

New York, Nov. 2 — Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona is the runaway choice in a nationwide poll of Republican Presidential preferences for 1964, taken by the Associated Press among Republican state and county leaders.

Of the 1,409 who answered a questionnaire, 1,194 or 85.1 per cent voted Goldwater as the party's strongest candidate against President Kennedy as of today.

Fewer, however, believe Goldwater will be nominated. Here his vote was 501 or 44.2 per cent of those who replied.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York received 56 votes as the strongest candidate and Richard M. Nixon, the 1960 GOP presidential candidate, received 44.
