Peace Corps Policy

Peace Corps says his agency's volunteers should not be required to support U.S. foreign policy when serving overseas. Rep. Otto E. Passman (D-La.) thinks otherwise.

In fact, Passman, a longtime critic of the Peace Corps, says Vaughn should either resign or be fired because he won't require volumeers overseas to support U.S. foreign policy, especially on Vietnam.
