I doubt they will provide a copy of NSAM 273 unless it has been released. I have no knowledge of this.

Write FOIA request on the envelope and the letter, both.

If they don't provide it you can appeal. If they do not act on your appeal you can sue.

I recently acquired a copy of your highly documented and well written book "Post Mortem" and wanted to inquire of you of how an individual such as myself can take advantage of the Freedom of Information Act. My request arises from an sincere interest to secure a reproduction of National Security Action Memorandum 273. As you are no doubt aware, NSAM 273 was the purported blue print for the massive introduction of American military personnel into Vietnam. NSAM 273 was apparently written during November 23-24, 1963.

I am a sincere and devoted student of the assassination of President Kennedy and I am determined to learn as much as possible about NSAM 273. The CIA has persistently refused to disclose NSAM 273 in its entirety.

If you can assist me with information on procedure requisite of requesting this information before instituting legal proceedings in federal district court I would sincerely appreciate it.
