Three Biy Specials Set For Week-end

Three specials in interest — two on TV and one on radio — are set for the week-end.

Channel 5 (WTTG) will present TV's first full-scale exploration of the Warren Commission Report on the assassination of President John F. Kennedy in a three-hour special tonight starting at 3.

During the program, titled, "A Re-examination of the Warren Commission Findings: A Minority Report," five authors of newsmaking books and articles on the assassination will confront each other for the first time to argue various aspects of the Commission's findings, which were issued in September 1964.

The participants will include Mark Lane, Leo Sauvage, Harold Weisberg, Penn Jones and Jacob Cohen. David Schoenbrun will act as host and syndicated columnist Jim Bishop will moderate.

Hungary a decade after the 1955 revolution against Communism will be subject of an NBC News special, "Back to Budapest," tomorrow on Channel 4 (6:30-7:30 p.m.).

Narrator Frank Bourgholtzer, who covered the uprising, returned recently to examine the changes of the past 10 years.

Cameras will view daily life in Budapest, and visit the factories and homes of workers, foremen and managers to show how they live and work.

"The Chase & Sanborn 102nd Anniversary Radio Show Honors the 40th Anniversary of NBC," a special saluting the entertainment and historic contributions of U.S. radio, will be presented on WRC (980 k.c.) tomorrow at 7:05 p.m.

Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, assisted by Mortimer Snerd and Effie Klinker, will host the program.

Forty five entertainers of radio's golden age will be heard including Fred Allen, Jack Benny, George Burns and Gracie Allen, Bob Hope, Al Jolson, Kate Smith, Fibber McGee and Molly, Ed Wynn, Rudy Vallee and Bing Crosby.

Tapes of momentous historical events such as V-J Day, the crash of the Zeppelin Hindenburg and the Normandy and Iwo-Jima landings are featured.

The program will also include the voice of: Presidents John F. Kennedy, Harry S. Truman, and Franklin D. Roosevelt, Speaker Sam Rayburn, Gabriel Heatter and H. V. Kaltenborn.
