Dear Sir:

In your "editorial" tonight you declared that the Marren Commission emerged from the recent New Orleans trial "unimpeached".

This is not accurate, is not fair comment, certainly cannot be based upon what it must be based on to have any validity whatsoever, the testimony in that trial.

Your station, its owner and the network with which it is affiliated have from the first maintained a partisen attitude, discriminating against me in particular and others who believe their government left too much to be desired in the investigation of the President's murder.

I hereby request equal opportunity to respond. I offer to limit myself to just this part of your editorial and in the doing I offer to restrict that to a quotation of the testimony of <u>defense</u> witnesses those <u>against</u> Garrison.

This, most certainly, is a controversial subject. I am the senior and the best-known local representative of the other side, having published seven books on various aspects of the subject.

I presume you will want to see in advance what I propose to say, and to that also I readily agree. I will also show you the verbatim transcripts, for they were published in the New Orleans papers (and were thus available to you).

For the first time anywhere, the Warren Commission <u>Mas</u> tested in a court of law, subject to cross-examination. The fact, the uncontestable truth, is exactly contrary to your representation. MTOP-TV has failed to report this in its news and has entirely misrepresented it in what it labels its "editorial".
