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## Court Asked To Reinstate Walker Aide

Lt. Col. Archibald E. Roberts, dismissed from active duty five years ago on charges of making an unauthorized right-wing speech, has filed a suit in U.S. District Court claiming that the Army has ignored a 1965 court order supporting his reinstatement.

In the suit filed Friday, Roberts asked the Court to force Army Secretary Stanley R. Resor to comply with its decision that he be reinstated with full pay, privileges, and allowances.

Roberts, 51, an aide to former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, was dismissed in April, 1962, after an impromptu talk before the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The motion for compliance demands that Roberts be granted:

- An active duty promotion to Lt. Col. with \$10,000 in back pay. He was given that rank in the reserves three months ago.

- The legal fees of \$20,000 he has incurred. The Army, he claims should have provided counsel free of charge.

- Annual leave time he would have accrued over the last three years had he not been removed from active duty.

In the DAR speech that prompted the Army action, Roberts accused the then Assistant Secretary of State G. Mennen Williams of leftist leanings and charged that Los Angeles Mayor Samuel Yorty had a Communist background.

Roberts delivered the impromptu talk after the Pentagon had refused to clear the formal speech he had prepared for the occasion. The original speech was a defense of Gen. Walker's "pro-blue" anti-Communist indoctrination program of the 24th Infantry troops he commanded.

Roberts, who retired in August, 1965, after he was restored to active duty by court order, was promoted in April from major to lieutenant colonel in the Reserves by the Army Board for the Correction of Military Records.
