I have just returned from a session of the Court and feel compelled

 limit to protect the Chief Justice of the United States, just as I

 and Government which I love and respect, as you also represent it.

For this reason, I think you should take immediate steps to insure
 the personal safety of yourself and members of your Court. I must
 admit you are a brave man to sit up there as you do, easily acces-
 sible to any crack-pot who cares to walk in. Surely you must real-
 ize that there are literally THOUSANDS of crack-pots who hate you
 with a passion sufficient to propel them into acts of violence. It oc-
 curred to me this morning, while sitting there, how easy it would
 be for anybody to throw a grenade, for instance, at all of you, and
 wipe out the entire Court.

In my opinion, to continue to let people come in there off the street
 without some kind of electronic search for weapons, grenades, etc,
 is ASKING for disaster, considering the armies of nuts in this world.

Let me make it crystal clear that this is no threat; I am concerned
 that some madman or desperate conspirator will add to the catastrophe
 we have already suffered in that a President could be so easily mur-
 dered. I respectfully suggest the installation of an electronic sensing
 device which would detect any weapons on the persons of visitors.
