AID DUE FOR A STUDY OF WARREN REPORT

William F. Buckley Jr., editor of the conservative fortnightly magazine National Review, said yesterday that a foundation of which he is an official is in the process of authorizing a \$2,000

which he is an official is in the process of authorizing a \$2,000 grant to study the adequacy of the Warren Commission's re-port on the assassination of President Kennedy. Mr. Buckley said the organ-ization was the Historical Re-search Foundation, set up by Alfred Kohlberg, a textile im-porter and China expert, who died April 7, 1960. The grant, he said, would support such an inquiry as that proposed—so far informally—by Richard N. Goodwin, former assistant spe-cial counsel to President Ken-nedy. The commission's conclusion that Lee Harvey Oswald was the lone assassin of the Presi-dent has come under fire from a number of critics. Mr. Buckley said yesterday, "I think the presumptions are with the Warren Commission's report, but I think as a public matter for the sake of the public tranquility" there should be a commission that is not partial to the report.
