

Critics of Report On JFK Murder To Appear on TV

NEW YORK — (UPI) — Appearing on a television seminar, four authors recently set forth their arguments that a conspiracy — and not Lee Harvey Oswald acting alone — was responsible for the murder of John F. Kennedy.

In a discussion program to be televised Saturday, the writers underscored some of the major criticisms of the Warren Commission report that have resulted in public demands for a re-opening of the investigation.

The authors were Mark Lane, attorney for Oswald's mother and author of "Rush to Judgment"; Leo Sauvage, correspondent for Le Figaro of Paris and author of "The Oswald Affair"; Harold Weisberg, author of "Whitewash," and Penn Jones, editor of the Midlothian (Tex.) Mirror and author of "Forgive My Grief."

Also appearing was Jacob Cohen, who is writing a book defending the Warren report.

The program was moderated by Jim Bishop, author of

a forthcoming book, "The Day Kennedy Was Shot."

Bishop said he did not believe "Tearing bits from the fabric is going to destroy the body of evidence" that Oswald acted alone.

The most telling evidence offered by critics of the report was the failure of commission members to talk to a sizable number of witnesses, including police and secret service men, who heard shots and saw puffs of smoke from a fence atop a grassy knoll overlooking the scene
