Philadelphia, Nov. 24 (AP)- Dist. Atty. Arlen Specter, an investigator for the Wavren Commission that probed President John F. Kennedy's assassination, says Texas Gov. John B. Connally is "just incorrect" in disputing the "single bullet" decision in the case.

Specter was instrumenta in developing the decision that said the bullet which hit Kennedy in the back of the neck existed through his throat and hit connally. Another bullet hit Kennedy in the head.

Connally said he believeds the first shot and a third shot hit Kennedy while the washit by the second one.

Specter, at anews conference, yesterday, said that based on home movies the commission "found compelling evidence that a single bullet struck Kennedy in the neck and then struck Connally."

Specter said, however, he did not eliminate the possibility three bullets hit the men, but said, "in any event, the single-shot as assumption is well-founded."

Regarding propesals that the investigation be reopened, Specter said, "I would not express any disagreement with anyone who wanted to review the commission's work or reopen the investigation, but personally I don't think this would serve any useful purpose. "There has been no new evidence and no sound inferences to change

in any way the conclusio s of logical deductions of the commission."

The commission found that Lee Harvey Oswald, acting alone, kalled Kennedy, a ruling that has been disputed.
