

**66% IN POLL ACCEPT  
KENNEDY PLOT VIEW**

Sixty-six per cent of the American people now believe that the assassination of President Kennedy was not the work of one man but a part of a conspiracy, according to a Louis Harris poll published yesterday in The Washington Post.

For the first time since Mr. Kennedy was slain, Mr. Harris said, a sizable majority of Americans believe that the assassination was part of a plot. In February 44 per cent of those polled felt that it was part of a conspiracy; 35 per cent thought that it was the work of one man, and 21 per cent were not sure. The comparable figures this month were 66 per cent, 19 per cent and 15 per cent, respectively.

On a related question, Mr. Harris reported that seven out of 10 of those polled felt that the Warren report had left "many important unanswered questions."

A major contributor of these feelings of doubt is the assassination investigation by District Attorney Jm Garrison, of New Orleans, Mr. Harris said.

Nearly two of three persons polled are following this investigation, he said, and of these 45 per cent believe it will shed light on the assassination, 46 per cent believe it will not and 9 per cent are not sure.

Persons under 35 years of age and persons from lower-income groups have all along been more prone to doubt the findings of the Warren Commission, Mr. Harris said.
