Dear Mr. Frank,

Writing the enclosed letter to Ms. King reminded me that you told George Gardner you wanted to meet me but could not come when he then was coming.


You are, of course, welcome (# 301/473-8186) and perhaps it might at some point be of use to Outlook to have an idea of what files and information are available here now and in the future (I'm 78 and not well) at local Hood College.

Aside from my own work product about a third of a million pages of once-withheld official records mostly relating to the investigations of the assassinations of President Kennedy and Dr. King.

In the event you do, to save you from writing instructions, assuming you leave from where it is how you'd come, take I270, which loses that identification at the first Frederick cloverleaf and becomes first US 15 and then US 40N to exit 7. Do not leave this road before then. Exit 7 puts you on Rosemont Ave., on which you turn right for about a city block, to a small road on the left, Shookstown Road. Take it to Old Receiver Road. Turn right there to our lane, several blocks, with our number on the large mailbox at its end. The lane goes to our home only.

A few landmarks. You will have been in a valley until you start going up Gambrill Mountain in the village of Shookstown. About three or four city blocks after you start ascending Old Receiver Road is the first road and it is on your right. About a city block on it is a fork. Stay to the left, going down a short, steep S-curve. The mailbox is about where the road starts uphill again.
