# Innocent, Says Thoresen Wife

FRESNO, Calif.—Louise Thoresen pleaded innocent to murdering her millionaire husband, William E. Thoresen III, 32, gun-collector, heir to a fortune estimated at \$70-million.

Mrs. Thoresen, 34, calmly responded "not guilty" to the formal charges of murder and possession of marijuana at her arraignment in municipal court. Judge George Hooper set June 30 for a preliminary hearing on whether she should be bound over to superior court for trial.

Mrs. Thoresen, was a speech therapist from a poor Chicago family when she married Thoresen, a handsome man afflicted with a stutter.

The nude body of Thoresen was found Wednesday in his Fresno home, shot repeatedly in the chest.

Police reported the house jammed with boxes and crates containing 50 pounds of marijuana plus land mines, pistols, knives, dynamite and other lethal weapons.

When arrested, police said, Mrs. Thoresen had a punctured ear drum, a pink "bruise" in her left hip and assorted bruises. She refused to discuss her injuries.
