

Weapons Cache Found in Norfolk

NORFOLK, Va., Jan. 8 (AP)—Federal agents and city police yesterday seized 39 automatic and semiautomatic firearms and three pistols from a mobile home off Military Highway after arresting the owner of the residence.

Three more machine guns were seized at his place of business.

Trim White Aydielt, 38, was arrested yesterday morning in Hogshire Trailer Court, off Hilton Avenue near North Military Highway.

Agents obtained search warrants and entered the mobile home while Aydielt appeared before U.S. magistrate Gilbert R. Swink Jr. on a charge of possessing an unregistered machine gun.

Several thousand rounds of assorted ammunition were taken from the trailer. A truck behind the Top Hat Billiards Parlor at 1315 East Little Creek Rd., operated by Aydielt, was searched and yielded three more automatic weapons authorities said.

The weapons included a Thompson submachine gun, a number of M1 Army and M2 carbines, a German Schneiders "burr gun" and some Army M16s and Communist-built AK-47s, both of

which are in use in the Vietnam war.

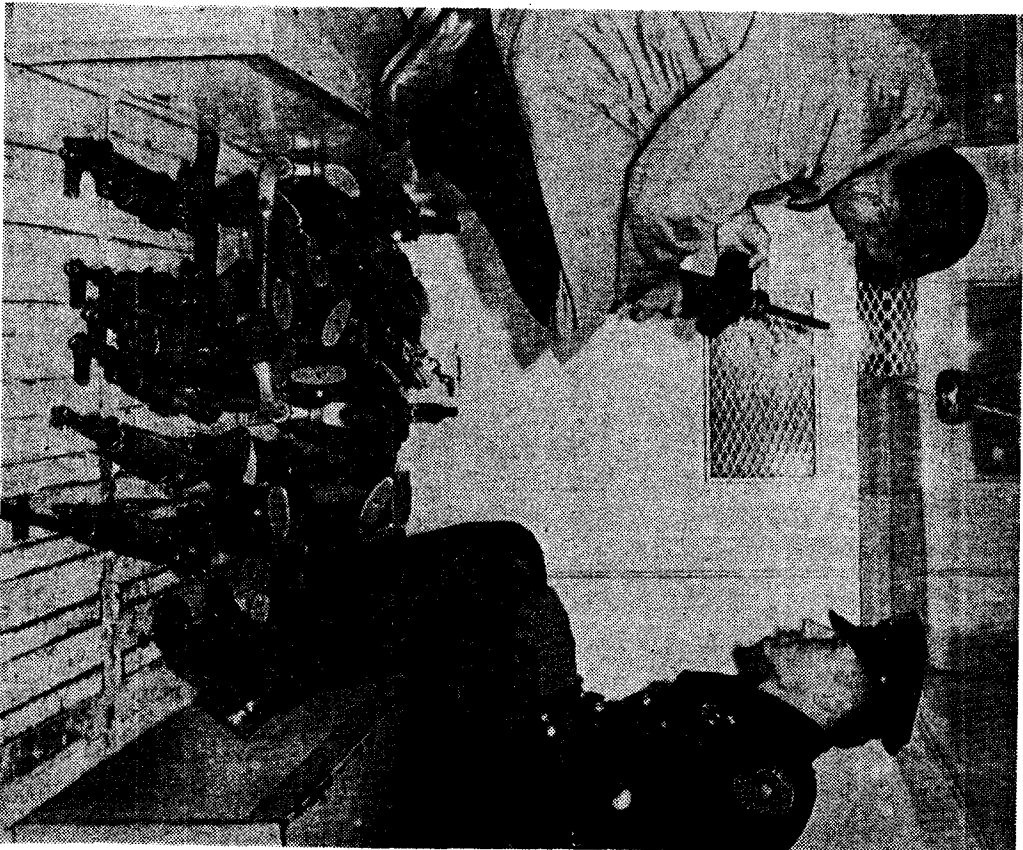
William I. McFarland, chief of the local office of the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Division of the Treasury Department, responsible for enforcing federal firearms laws, said his investigation has yet to uncover the intended destination of the weapons.

Prison Jaycees Against Crime
