The local judge had said an aspect of the basic decision I had argued should go to the higher court and it might be that. I argued that whatever the legislative intent, it was apparent that the Act discriminated against us seniors.

I also argued incomplete discovery and denial of access to the medical records subpoenaed for me.

and other things I don't have clearly in mind now.

So. we'll see.

And at least I wasn't thrown out, which is what the other sidem has, of course, tried to do consistently.
