Maybe I'll have more by then. Either I will or they'll be still enother suit, against Archives and the executor of the estate. I now have clear photos, without the lithographic screen, piqtures that can be enlarged.

Why I can't tell, and whether accidental or purposeful is also a mystery, but in preparing a composite for the Commission, its Exhibit 60, the FBI printed the enlargement of the read damage to the shirt upside down. Typically, no boday paid close enough attention to catch it, either on the Commission staff or the "buffs".

There has been another change since I wrote. Bud thinks the suit on the spectro is great. He will handle that one. I gave him a draft of the complaint and about 30 exhibits, which are not all, but enough to do a little shaking up, and he wants to add almost that many more!

he hasn't yet had a chance to read the other two I've completed, one of which will interest you rather much, I think.
