Dear Mr. Kollender:

The enclosed Special Report of August 16, 1936 by Operator 3568 (R. C. Kilgore) has been transcribed from reassembled scraps taken from the waste of the R. A. & I. Atlanta office.

I quote from the transcription of another such document from Ivey to Rice.

"As a matter of interest to you I would like to give my personal views on the subject. I sincerely believe that there will be a great deal of blood shed if, and when, the strikes now proposed break. Thus far, we have been lucky here in the South by handling matters which have had no particular disturbance about them. This is of a different nature. These Southerners have been wrought up to a high pitch and I am enclosing a clipping of an event which took place in Talladega, Alabama. This is from this morning's paper.

I was fortunate in foreseeing this trouble and removed 3640 just before it happened or she might have been in the midst of it."

The "subject" referred to was the providing of guards to Gordon McKelvey (Tennessee Manufacturers Association, Nashville, Tennessee).
