Dear Harold:

The affidavit of Sheriff Flowers was included in the section on Colonel J. J. Johnston and put with the Exhibits. It was decided two or three days before the hearing not to use this material but to reserve it for the Rubber hearing. I thought some of turning it over to Patterson for him to look over and it is possible that I did so, although I cannot be certain. In any event you might ask him if he has any recollection about it. The other possibility is that the proposed trial outline and exhibits on Johnston were put back in that big box which Rosenberg was guarding. I am sorry I can not help you more about it, but I confess I am pretty vague. I do think that I had copies made of it and it is possible that a copy of it may be found in the files, although I assume you have already looked there.

I wonder if you would mind telling Miss Arbuthnot that I am looking around for my credentials and will certainly send them back when I locate them. Will you also ask her to look in my brief case which is a zipper case which I left in the file cabinet in room 247-c. I'd appreciate it if she'd rescue it for me and it is possible she will find the credentials in there.

I see that you're in the papers again and it makes me terribly homesick. I wish Wohlforth could figure out something I could do here to keep my hand in. Have the first hearing records been printed as yet? If so, I wish you would ask Susie to send me a copy since I am writing a comment on Labor Espionage for the Yale Law Journal.

Good luck to you and let me know when you are having your next hearing. Maybe I can get down to listen in.
