## FIFTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE ON AMERICAN CIVILIZATION

The fifth annual Conference on American Civilization will take place on April 16 and 17, 1968 at Walter Johnson High School in Bethesda, Maryland. Sponsored by the Montgomery County Region of the Maryland Association of Student Councils, the conference was conceived to give students an opportunity to discuss subjects of major national interest with outstanding individuals in the respective fields. Nearly 1,000 high school students, representing many of our fifty states and the District of Columbia, are expected to attend.

The format of last year's two day conference, two general assemblies and thirty seminar groups, provided delegates with the opportunity to hear assembly speakers, Carlton Sickles, former Maryland Congressman, and the Honorable William O. Douglas, Associate Justice, Supreme Court of the United States. Some of last year's most outstanding seminars included, "How Much News Really Gets Through," led by columnist Jack Anderson; "Civil Liberties in America," led by Mitchell Rogovin, Assistant Attorney General, United States Department of Justice; "Morality of the Vietnam War," led by Mr. Alan Brownfeld of the Senate Internal Securities Committee; "The Role of the John Birch Society in America," led by Mr. Ernest Brosang, Regional Coordinator for the John Birch Society; and the seminar lead by Mr. Andrew Busby, Chairman of the Washington Metropolitan Area Chapter of Students for a Democratic Society, "The Student Left."

Maintaining the same general format as last year, the fifth Annual Conference on American Civilization (COAC '68) will commence and conclude with a general assembly. Thirty-one seminars will be conducted on such diverse topics as: "Art: The Mirror of Society," "The Philosophy of Teenagerism," The Washington Merry-Go-Round," "The Black Power Movement," and "College Football - National Playoff?" The 1968 Conference Steering Committee, in an attempt to increase the student participation in a greater variety of seminar topics, has arranged the COAC schedule so the delegates may elect to attend three one hour discussions each day or two one and one-half hour discussion groups each day.

Without a doubt, COAC '68, is the most unusual and ambitious undertaking attempted by the youth of the State of Maryland. As the Vice President of the United States, Hubert H. Humphrey, expressed it:

Your general assemblies and seminar groups will provide a splendid opportunity to hear, to see, to learn, to teach on problems which do merit our best attention. You and your fellow students have much to contribute - not just in the years ahead, but right now by your enlightened considerations of others' views and presentation of your opinions . . . . It is a heartwarming example of student leadership in a dialogue for a better America.
