

# Dum-Dum <sup>E1</sup> Bullet <sup>1950</sup> Killed JFK <sup>Times</sup> <sup>11-28/63</sup>

Washington. — It was a dum-dum bullet that shattered the head and life of President John F. Kennedy.

That's what the Dallas doctors who attended him have told the FBI.

They stated the dum-dum bullet fragmented when it hit the President, shattering a portion of his head and neck.

Dallas police, who have confirmed this medical finding to the FBI, have matched bullet fragments removed from the President and the car he was riding in with the spent shells found in the warehouse.

These shells definitely were fired from the rifle the suspected assassin bought from a mail order company.

Rep. Edwin Willis, D-La., chairman of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, has sent veteran investigators to Dallas to dig into Lee Oswald's leftist background and trips to Russia and Mexico.

Fifteen days before he was shot down, President Kennedy was warned that assassins were being trained in Russia to commit murders in the U.S. and England.

This warning was voiced in a letter Rep. Charles Kirsten, R-Milwaukee, sent to the late President and his brothers, Attorney General Robert Kennedy and Sen. Edward Kennedy, Mass. Kirsten knew the President for many years, having served with him on the House Labor Committee.

The Wisconsin legislator never received a reply to his warning from any of the Kennedys.

The burden of Kirsten's letter was an effort to obtain administration help in focusing public attention on the assassination of Stephan Bandera, the Ukrainian underground leader, by Communist agents. In urging this, Kirsten wrote:
