The Louisville Division advised on August 9, 1938, that in the year 1938 Harold Veisberg as connected with the Committee on Education and Labor, United States Senate, and was in Harlan, Kentucky, during the trial of United States versus Mary Helen Coal Corporation, et al - Civil Rights and Domestic Violence. (44-175-348)

In March, 1940, when Harold Veisberg as interviewed in connection with an official investigation, he stated that he was employed by the LeFollette Civil Liberties Committee until June, 1939, and thereafter did special research work for the Dies Committee. (61-7507-624; Statement furnished by Horold Veisberg to Special Agents Washington Field Division.)

advised on May 8, 1940 that Harold Teisberg was the Washington correspondent of the magazine "Friday" published in New York City. Remain the author of an article in the second issue of this magazine which attacked the then Assistant Secretary of State, Adolf A. Berle, Jr. (65-2839-14)

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THE DELL'S

In December, 1942, and October, 1943, one Marold Weisburg was connected with the offices of Congressman Vito Madeantonio. It is not known if this individual is identical with the sale of this community (constitution)

In March, 1946, Harold Weisberg as employed in the Research an Analysis Branch, Latin American Division, Office of Strategic Services, later known as the Division of the American Republics, State Department. The recerts of the State Department reflect that Weisberg was born in Fennsylvania on April 3, 1913. Highly confidential sources have advised that Weisberg was a mutual friend of both of whom are known to have Communical sympothics.

Harold Weisborg was discharged from the State Department on June 23, 1947, under the provisions of the McCarran rider to the State Department's Appropriations Bill, according to (22-08740-61)

An article appeared in the Washington Times-Revald Lated Scalemer 21, 1947, entitled "Custed State Department Aides are Identified." This article was written by James Walter and listed among the ten employees dismissed by the State Department on Jame 23, 1947, the name of Marold Weisburg, 1800 Block North Nottingham Street, Arlington, Virginia, assignment not disclosed. (62-39749-A)

An article apleared in the Washington Post dated Movember 12, 1947, which stated that the State Department on the previous date had "backed down" on the firing without a trial of the individuals whose loyalty has said to be in question. The article stated that the employees were free to regim with nothing on their records against them. The State Department's position was reversed to evoid any possible injectice. (Wash. Post 11-18-47, page 1)

Information Appearing in State Department Files

The file on this individual was reviewed at the State Department on November 13, 1947, at which time it was determined that on December 5, 1946, the State Department sent to the Bareau for a spot check the subject's fame.

This request was returned by the Bureau with the motation, "No information." On December 20, 1946, information was subdied to the State Department, although the source was not stated, that subject was a "known friend and contact of persons identified as active in the Gregory case. Mature of association not now known."

It was noted that the State Department of no time unde a request of the Bareau for investigative assistance in this east. The State Department initiated an investigation of Weisberg on November 20, 1946, which carbinate until June 20, 1947, on which date the subject was dismissed. The State Department's investigation revealed that customary sources such as margin whood investigation, reference checks, police department checks, review of Birth reports, as well as the Committee on Un-American Schrifting were covered.

Was also noted that on April 14, 1947, the State Department placed a mail cover on Weisberg. This coverage was discontinued on June 2, 1917.

HAROLD WEISHERS

There has been no request received from the State Lepartment for an investigation or a name check on Harold Weisberg. (100-351938)

The State Department advised that Weisberg was one of the ten employees to be dismissed on that date under the Mc-Carran rider. (62-39749-913)

July 9, 1947

A memorandum from Assistant Attorney General Theren L. Caudle regarding the ten State Department employees which requested all material not previously furnished. (100-351938-2)

July 17, 1947

A memorandum from the Assistant to the Attorney Jeneral Douglas W. McGregor attaching a copy of a letter from the State Department dated July 11, 1947, listing the names of the employees dismissed by the State Department under the McCarran rider. He desired to know if there was any possible criminal prosecution in connection with these individuals. (100-351938-3)

August 5, 1947

A summary memorandum regarding Harold Weisberg which was furnished to the Attorney General. (100-551526-3)

September 6, 1947

A duplicate summary regarding Weisberg which was furnished to the Attorney General at his request. (62-39749-962)

Hovember 18, 1947

An article appeared in the "Machington Post" on this date which stated that the State Department on the previous date had allowed seven of the dishissed State Department employees who had been dishissed for security reasons, to resign without prejudice. The State De-partment made this decision in order to avoid a possible injustice to them. ("Machington Fost" dated 11/19/47, p.1)
