Humphrey Leads In Mass. Survey

BOSTON. Oct. 10 (AP)—A Boston Globe survey released today gives Democratic presidential candidate Hubert H. Humphrey 44 per cent of the vote in Massachusetts; GOP standard-bearer Richard M. Nixon 31 per cent; third-party candidate George C. Wallace 8 per cent, and shows 17 per cent undecided.

The Globe said the poll was conducted from Sept. 19 to Oct. 2 by Becker Research Corp. of Boston, public opinon analysis, and was based on in-home interviews with 573 persons selected to represent the opinions of all voting-age

state resident.

Nixon's Own Poll Gives Him 2-Point Advantage

NEW YORK, Oct. 10 (AP)—The New York State Nixon-Agnew Committee said today its own presidential poll in the state shows Richard M. Nixon running two percentage points ahead of Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

The poll, taken over the past two weeks, gives Republican Nixon 39 per cent of the vote, Democrat Humphrey 37 per cent, third-party candidate George C. Wallace 12 per cent and 12 per cent undecided.

Benjamin Frank, Nixon's state campaign chairman, said the poll was taken by seven hired interviewers who questioned 1500 voters.

Birch Founder Warns
