elf as Wheat's wife, Elizabeth, said her husband had left the cabin on foot without luggage about a week ago.

The Wheats moved from the house that day, after stating they were moving to Ashland. They

Ashcraft said he had not seen Wheat "for about three weeks."

Mrs. Aubrey Flaming, who lives about a mile from the DeLap ranch on the Merrill Highway, said her husband had had a conversation with Wheat during his residency in that area.

She described Wheat as a "weirdo," said the large dogs discouraged visiting and that because of "politically fanatical" views attributed to Wheat, her family "left them alone."

Mrs. Fleming confirmed that the Wheats lost money at the ranch and moved in the spring of 1967. The pre-vious fail, she said, Wheat reportedly had back surgery in a Medford hospital.

Leslie Williams now occupies the DeLap home.

Efforts to locate Wheat in Malin or Tulelake, Calif., have been futile, according to Malin Marshal Jim Puckett.

The Los Angeles Times said Wheat was born July 30, 1913, in Rochelle, La., registered as an ex-convict in California and from 1931 to 1984 lived in the house on South Lafayette Park Place, now razed, where the Kennedy assassination discussions allegedly took place.

They said Wheat had served time for robbery in Louisiana and burglary in Texas in addition to the marder ran.

Wheat was the West Coast leader of the Committee of One Million Caucasions to March on Congress, July 1, 1964, an anti-Negro, anti-Se-mite, anti - Catholic group formed by the Ku Klux Klan, the LA Times reported.

Wheat is described as 5 feet 10 or 11 inches, heavy set, ruddy complicationed, dark black hair and black moustache.

Superior Court Judge Richard B. Eaton signed an order earlier in Redding directing Wheat to appear in court Monday to either go to New Orleans or either go to New Orleans or show cause why he should not. The order was signed hours after Dist. Atty. Robert Baker received a subnoena and \$535 for travel fare for Wheat from New Orleans Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison. The judge dispatched sheriff's deputies to serve the papers.

Wheat, active in right-wing political activities in Los Angeles, was living in the twostory green and white frame cabin in remote country about 12 miles from this timber producing community.

The house was secured for him, his wife and their two St. Bernard dogs by a friend, Hal W. Hunt, Burney, publisher of a far-right weekly newspater called the National Chronicle.

The building belongs to John Camerlo, a San Pablo; Calif., contractor and real estate man. and Arthur Anderson, a Rich-mond, Calif., fireman. Camerlo said they occupied the dwelling

without his permission. Camerlo said when Anderson visited the property recently he was denied entry by a woman who threatened to turn loose a St. Bernard on him. He said Hunt identified the Wheats as friends and said they had his permission to live in the house.

Garrison reportedly also subpoenaed Dr. Stanley L. Drennan, 52, of Los Angeles. Dren-nan has refused to comment on Garrison's move.
