Dear Mr Weisberg,

Thank you for writing to Mr Callier and authorizing me to see the manuscript. I went by yesterday at noon and had a very pleasant conversation with Mr Callier, after which I spent the remainder of the day and part of the night reading your book from cover to cover.

I believe that you have written an excellent and brilliant attack on the Warren Report, and I marvel that you completed it so quickly as you did. The scholarship is extremely good, and I believe you have done much farther into the available sources than the author of the Warren Report did in his aspect of the case. It is appalling that your manuscript has been sitting for so long without the deserved results. Your book should have been published as a major and definitive work. To compare it with Silvia Fox's book is almost inadvertent, and that had a remarkable commercial success. Unfortunately, it is a loss to understand why no publisher has grabbed the opportunity, if not from a sense of history and obligation, than at least out of intelligent self-interest.

My manuscript coincides with yours to a large extent. As I mentioned on the telephone, parallel "discoveries" and interpretations are inevitable when people of fairly similar perceptivities attack the same body of information. Certainly I would have no difficulty whatever in asserting your conclusions and your evaluations, speaking very generally. As to the particular, in a number of instances you have made out a stronger argument than I have; in other instances, I have "filled" fuller (though not necessarily stronger) presentation of the same material, having had the advantage of an additional year of time. My manuscript includes some aspects of the case that you have not treated—for example, a long chapter on "Hidell"—but that material supplements the charges against the Warren Report which are easily substantiated and are not essential in that they introduce no elements of negligence, deception, etc.

I have no hesitation in saying that in many ways your book is tighter, better written, and more cohesive than mine, and that I would be happy to see yours in print, if it was "fit for print". Therefore, I am enclosing a copy of the letter I received from Mr Walsh. I believe that you should write to him, indicating that I have sent you a copy of his letter to me, and offer him your manuscript. Provided, of course, that you are willing to consider placement or serialized publication. If you prefer, I would be glad to write to Mr Walsh and urge him to contact you and request your book. Let me know.

I am also enclosing (1) a copy of my chapter "The Proof of the Plot" in which you will see that our reasoning was quite similar in evaluating the Odie testimony and its implications; (2) a copy of the "Uncovered Letters" which constitute an addendum to my manuscript.

Again, I can only repeat my congratulations on your achievement, and my genuine admiration of a beautiful job done with remarkable confidence. I shall certainly rejoice to see your book published and if I can be of any help I will gladly do so.

I very much appreciate your willingness to let me see the manuscript. Please let me know when you decide, and especially do let me know if you are coming to New York. I shall return this to Mr Callier without delay.
