

Deposition of Dr. Ronald Coy Jones, March 24, 1964, 6H51-57.

Questioning by Specter.

Dr. Jones is a resident physician in general surgery at Parkland. He saw the anterior neck wound (page 53) and described it "no greater than a quarter of an inch in greatest ^{diameter...}~~diameter~~". He also stated that it was "just above the suprasternal notch". In his report at the time of the emergency he had said (6H55) of the neck wound, "thought to be a bullet entrance wound".

If it had been an exit "you would think that it exited at a very low velocity to produce no more damage than this had done..." It would be consistent "... with an exit wound" only if $\frac{1}{2}$ "very low velocity to the point that you might think that this bullet ~~barely~~ barely made it through the soft tissues and just enough to drop out of the skin on the opposite side." He sees as many as 4 or 5 bullet wounds a night. He also was rehearsed.
