The can be an important witness on the presence of people on the grassy knoll, ignored by the formission and the federal investigative agencies, and the "puff of smoke", which can be a very great boomerang if used as Wark did. He one expects the witnesses of great drematic events to have infallible recollection of the most intimate details. Holland makes one very gross error. It is dramatic as it can be in the absence of cross-examination. I went into this with Schiller, who misused it, but the essence is a matter of record and was known to the Commission, for it is in his interview.

He says, with some emotion, that a Secret Service men in the President's car got up and waved a machinegun around, Mark knew better and the FBI and Commission lawyers knew better. Molland is undoubtedly sincere. He is also closento right. It happened, but in the next car. The existing photo record of the President's car make clear that Greer kept sitting with his hands on the wheel and LKelderman's only movements were in turning. They were the daily agents in the President's car. By showing that this did happen in the followup car, which was tailgating, the testimony being that ath thek time of the shooting it was but five feet away (as Mix, Muchmore and Zepruder also show), I think this curse can be removed for a Molland and, to the judge at least, he can be made credible.
