I have reviewed Mr. Weisberg's medicines. No medicine interacts with <u>doxepin</u>. However, he probably has <u>Benign Prostatic Hypertrophy</u>, this is why he is taking <u>Proscar</u>. <u>Doxepin</u> can give urinary retention in this group of patients (unable to urinate requiring a trip to the emergency room to be catheterized).

UV B (ultraviolet B) therapy seems like the safer alternative. Its major drawback is the time needed to drive to the doctors office to receive the three times weekly therapy. I don't know his level of motivation; some patients become suicidal because of itch and will do anything to stop it. If he cannot find a dermatologist to give him phototherapy, I can prescribe a Jordan Lamp for use in the home. I can walk him through how to use it. It is a few hundred dollars.

A final note. His <u>Lac Hydrin</u> is excellent for dry skin and it helps a bit with itch. At UW we typically also precribe <u>Triamcinolone Cream 0.1% mixed 50/50 in petrolatum</u> for itch. It helps, but I Would not expect it alone to relieve the itch.
