I, [REDACTED] state that I have read a letter directed by G. Robert Blakey, Chief Counsel and Director, Select Committee on Assassinations, U.S. House of Representatives, Washington, D.C., to the Honorable Griffin R. Bell, Attorney General of the United States, on April 10, 1978, concerning [REDACTED] and Antulio Ramirez Ortiz.

I have no specific recollection of having ever interviewed [REDACTED] possibly known as [REDACTED] concerning Antulio Ramirez Ortiz or any other matter.

It is noted that I am currently assigned to the Santa Maria, California, Resident Agency and have been so assigned since September 10, 1973. Prior to that time I was assigned to our Los Angeles headquarters, 11000 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, where I worked primarily Cuban type matters. It is my recollection that we moved to our 11000 Wilshire Boulevard address from 1340 West Sixth Street, Los Angeles, on or about November 17, 1969. b7c

Sometime after we had relocated in our new Wilshire Boulevard headquarters, specific date and year not recalled, I recall being contacted by SA [REDACTED], who had general complaint duty in the office that day, and SA [REDACTED] requested my assistance in a Spanish-language interview of an unknown Cuban female, due to the fact that at that time most of the cases assigned to me for investigation were Cuban matters, and due to the fact that SA [REDACTED] was not fluent in the Spanish language. To the best of my recollection, this is the only joint interview conducted by myself and SA [REDACTED]

I recall interviewing this unknown Cuban female with SA [REDACTED] but the only thing of the conversation I can remember was information pertaining to someone else, and she mentioned the use of microdots. I further recall that this was an extremely rambling conversation. I recall nothing whatsoever pertaining to any statement concerning Lee Harvey Oswald or the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. I do not recall this conversation having anything to do with anyone returning from Cuba and in fact, I do not recall the gist of the conversation. To my knowledge, I did not make any form of written communication pertaining to this interview.

I believe the Cuban female was in her middle 30's, was thin in stature, had long brown hair, and wore a pastel-colored dress. Other than the above, I recall no additional information pertaining to this interview.

As a matter of personal policy, I always identify myself either orally or in writing to persons that contact me during the normal course of my employment. It would not have been unusual in this case for me to have furnished both my name and the name of SA [REDACTED] to the woman described above.

I do not recall if SA [REDACTED] was fully involved in the interview inasmuch as I do not recall specifically what his fluency was in the Cuban dialect at that time.
