

Five Aides Promoted at White House

President Nixon yesterday named five new special assistants to jobs paying \$30,000 to \$35,000.

The appointments included promoting four members of his White House staff and bringing in a fifth from the Defense Department.

Dr. Theodore Marrs, 56, who has served in the Defense Department since 1964, moved to the White House to assist William Baroody, another former Defense Department official, in maintaining liaison with outside groups.

Members of the White House staff promoted were:

- David J. Wimer, who has served as a deputy special assistant in the White House since February, 1973, after a year in the Labor Department. A native of Burbank, Calif., he will head the White House personnel office formerly headed by Jerry Jones. Jones is now the White House staff secretary.

- Nowl C. Koch, 35, who has been a staff assistant to the President's speechwriters since January, 1971. Koch now is a key member of the speech writing team.

- Charles M. Lichenstein 47, who has been serving as deputy to presidential counselor Dean Burch since Burch joined the White House staff three months ago. He will continue to serve in that capacity. A former instructor at Yale University and Notre Dame, he worked on Nixon's staff when he was Vice President and has served in a variety of government positions.

- Dr. David C. Hoopes, 31, who has been on the White House staff since April, 1971. He will work in an administrative capacity.
