WAR PROTEST PARADE SLATED

N.O. College Students to Join in Dissent

New Orleans college and university students will join a nationwide protest against the Vietnam War Wednesday with a parade through the city at 2 p.m.

Police said Wednesday three groups of marchers have been granted parade permits and will march through the city.

The three groups will assemble at Elysian Fields and N. Claiborne, Freret and Calhoun and the New Orleans Medical Center on Tulane ave., and march to the U.S. Federal Building, 701 Loyola Avenue, to distribute pamphlets. They will continue to Canal and to the Wild Life and Fisheries Building on Royal Street for more leaflet passing. They will wind up at Jackson Square for speeches and music.

A service for those who died in Vietnam will begin the day at Loyola University. The Rev. Joseph Tetlow, S.J., will deliver a plea for peace outside Marquette Hall, the school's newspaper, The Maroon said.

Tulane University's newspaper, The Hullabaloo, said student senate president Walter Blessey asked the university's faculty and administration to observe a day of peace and said he had reserved the University Center's quadrangle for the day's activities.

There is no university recognition of the activities, a Tu-

lane spokesman said.

Students at LSUNO passed a resolution last week that the student government and the school paper, The Driftwood, call for a moratorium on classes and that students stay away from classes and ring doorbells to spread their message concerning the war.

A Dillard University spokesman said nothing was mentioned about the Vietnam Moratorium Day at Thursday's regular meeting of the student un-

ion.

In Baton Rouge, Art Smith, chairman of the LSU Moratorium Committee in Baton Rouge, said the university administration has taken a handsoff policy toward the event.

One pro-war group at LSU has called for a counter moratorium for the week of Oct. 12-18 to celebrate "Victory in Vietnam Week." Mike Conley, president of Young Americans for Freedom, said the counter moratorium is designed "to mobilize support for our fighting men for a military victory."
