Dear Mr. Yslas:

I am writing in regard to releasing to the public the Los Angeles Police Department files gathered during the investigation of Senator Robert Kennedy's death.

In particular, I wish to support the Commission's view, stated in August 1975: "that the public should have full and free access to all information gathered during the department's investigation so long as the rights of privacy of individuals involved are protected and the ability of the department to effectively enforce the law is not seriously impaired..."

Full disclosure of the files and documents relating to Senator Kennedy's death is necessary to preserve the information gathered for the historical record.

The public interest will be greatly served when the records are made available to the public.

Enough time has passed since the incident to render useless any argument in favor of keeping this critical information under lock and key.


