DALLAS -In the perverse politics of Texas, Democrats have observed the melancholy anniversary of John F. Kennedy's death by reopening the vicious intraparty war that Kennedy journeyed here to settle three years ago.

A powerful coalition of Texas Democrats — liberals, labor, Negroes and Latin Americans - bolted the party Nov. 8 to elect Republicans, including Sen. John G. Tower and

two Congressmen.

Fresh from that spoiler victory, leaders of the coalition are vowing now to sit on their hands or vote Republican if Lyndon B. Johnson is at the head of the Democratic ticket
