JACK ANDERSON: House investigators have uncovered dramatic new evidence that James Earl Ray, the accused killer of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., may not have acted alone. Ray used phony passports to slip out of the country, the investigators said in a report to the Select Committee on Assassinations, and got as far as Portugal where he received "further instructions" from a secret conspirator.

The investigators also have uncov-

ered some intriguing new information about Lee Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin of President John F. Kennedy. According to the report, the committee staff "spent several hours questioning an ex-CIA agent who had come forth to relate his personal knowledge of conversations between Oswald and the personnel within the Cuban and Soviet embassies in Mexico City." No evidence has been uncovered, however, that Oswald discussed the Kennedy assassination at either embassy.
