MORRIS, ROBERT
Dallas, Texas

Born Jersey City, 1914; LLB Fordham University, 1939; Assistant Counsel, New York State Investigating Committee, 1940-41; naval intelligence officer, 1941-46; Assistant to Rep. F. R. Coudert, Jr. (R-N.Y.), 1946-50; minority staff member with Tydings Committee investigating charges of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy against the State Department, 1950; Counsel, Senate Internal Security Subcommittee, 1951-53 and 1956-58 [earlier term included McCarran Committee's re-investigation of McCarthy's charges]; judge, New York City Municipal Court, 1954-56. (Who's Who, 1962-63)

Unsuccessful candidate, against incumbent Clifford Case, for Republican Senatorial nomination in New Jersey, 1960. Among those listed by the Washington Post as backing Morris were: Adm. Ben Moreell, Charles Edison and Gen. Robert Johnson, all of Americans for Constitutional Action; former Congressman Fred Hartley; public relations executive James P. Selva; and right-wing radio commentators Fulton Lewis, Jr. and Dan Smoot. The Morris campaign was credited with expenditures several times those of the Case campaign, a "conservative" estimate being set at \$200,000. (Washington Post 4/17/60)

President, University of Dallas, 1960-62; his resignation from this post was announced by the Chancellor, Bishop Gorman, who said that it had been accepted as being "to the interest of all"; Morris denied any "conflict in philosophy with the university," and said that he wanted "to be completely unencumbered as we approach what I feel is a time of great crisis in the United States." President, Defenders of American Liberty, since 1962. This is a conservative organization which claims to be patterned on the American Civil Liberties Union, but without the general membership aspect. (Christian Science Monitor 1/2/63) On behalf of the organization, Morris has served as attorney for former-General Edwin Walker. (Ibid. and Dallas Times-Herald 11/25/62)

All they have to do is to get 55 per cent and we will be handcuffed to an organization controlled by a dedicated enemy." Deletions in brochure)

Morris has a regular column, frequently titled "Around the World," which appears in such widely separated papers as the Dallas Morning News, the Brooklyn Tablet, and the Santa Barbara Freedom Press.

Philosophy: Morris has long emphasized the internal threat from Communism. A favorite recent target has been the United Nations and the disarmament negotiations. He has called the latter a "plan to dissolve the United States, as it exists today," and has written: "When we hear Adlai Stevenson press for the creation of a world army with the United States subordinated to it and realize that this can only mean merger with our enemy, could it be that . . . /the socialist/ planners are helping to create left-leaning neutrals all over the world to make the prospect of merger more palatable for Khrushchev."
