

Excerpt from cassette 2/B, at approximately 15 on scale:

Ervin: Now Senator Muskie was one of the candidates for the Democratic nomination for President at that time.

McCord: Yes, sir.

Ervin: Did you rent any office near the Muskie headquarters?

McCord: I did.

Ervin: Where was that? Where was the Muskie headquarters?

McCord: I believe the address was listed as 1972 K Street, but it was next to 1908 K Street, which was an office location that I leased at the request of Mr. Liddy.

Ervin: Now where was this office located with reference to the headquarters of Senator Muskie?

McCord: It was the next building to Senator Muskie's office.

Ervin: And I believe the lease was taken in the names of your name and that of John P. Hayes.

McCord: Yes, sir.

Ervin: Who was John P. Hayes?

McCord: That was another name for Mr. Liddy.

Ervin: Later Mr. McGovern took over these headquarters of Senator Muskie, didn't he?

McCord: I think after June 17th, yes, sir.

Ervin: Was there ever any discussion between you and Mr. Liddy about exercising any kind of surveillance over Senator McGovern's headquarters?

McCord: There were, sir; they were in the context of the location on 1st Street primarily.

Ervin: And this room was really for possible use in that connection, wasn't it?

McCord: 1908 K Street was, yes, sir.

Ervin: Do you remember how long the lease of the room continued?

McCord: Yes, sir. It continued till July 1972, when I cancelled it.
