# Raid Has 'Mission Impossible' Ring

The raid against the headquarters of the Democratic National Committee was carried out with all the gadgetry and ingenuity of television's "Mission Impossible" — except for the one incredible omen that led to the arrest of a suspect.

When arrested Saturday night, police said, the suspect was in the range of the camera's lens.
