

RIGHTS CHARGE MADE BY BUGGING SUSPECT

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MIAMI, Oct. 26—Bernard L. Barker, indicted in the break-in at Democratic headquarters in Washington, accused his Federal and state prosecutors today of violating his civil rights.

Asking for 12-million in damages, Mr. Barker asked the Federal District Court here to restrain the prosecutors from continuing to press Federal and Florida criminal charges against him.

Arrested with four other men on June 17 at the party headquarters at the watergate complex, Mr. Barker has been charged in the Federal case with "conspiracy, interception of oral and wire communications, second-degree burglary and unlawful possession of the intercepting devices." His trial in the Federal District Court in Washington has been set for Nov. 16.

In Miami, the 55-year-old real estate broker and notary public is accused of "falsely and fraudulently" acknowledging the signature of Kenneth H. Dahlberg, chairman of the Minnesota Committee for the Re-election of the President, on a \$25,000 check. The check, deposited last April into the account of Mr. Barker's company here, was part of a total of \$114,000 that had gone through the Finance Committee to Re-elect the President.

The Florida trial has been scheduled to begin Monday before Judge Paul Baker of the Dade County Criminal Court.

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
