

Gov. Evans Worker Says He Was Spy

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 29 (UPI)—An employee of Gov. Dan Evans' re-election committee said today he posed as a college student during last year's election campaign to travel with Evans' Democratic opponent and secretly report on his campaign activities.

Theodore Bundy, now a special assistant to Washington Republican Chairman Ross Davis, said in an interview that his connection with Evans' campaign was kept secret during the campaign while he travelled with Democratic candidate Albert D. Rosellini.

Bundy said he started early in the campaign as an unsalaried volunteer and was later given a nominal salary for expenses by the Evans organization.

His role was to follow Rosellini on the campaign trail, keep track of Rosellini's schedule and remarks, and occasionally question Rosellini directly on issues. To accomplish his mission Bundy posed as a college student working for his master's degree in political science by writing a paper on the gubernatorial race.
